

2014 Hhs Poverty Guidelines

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Poverty guidelines since 1982 for the 48 contiguous states and the District of Columbia can be calculated by addition using the figures shown below. (This simple calculation procedure gives correct guideline figures for each year, but it is not identical to the procedure by which the poverty guidelines are calculated from the poverty thresholds each year; see an example calculation.)

Prior HHS Poverty Guidelines and Federal Register ...

Persons in family/household. Poverty guideline. For families/households with more than 8 persons, add \$4,420 for each additional person. 1.

2019 Poverty Guidelines | ASPE

The HHS issues poverty guidelines for each household size. For example, the poverty level for a household of four in 2021 is an annual income of \$26,500. To get the poverty level for larger families, add \$4,540 for each additional person in the household.

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For smaller families, subtract \$4,540 per person.

The Color of Child Poverty. There are dramatic disparities in child poverty rates by race/ethnicity: in 2014, child poverty rates were highest for children who are non-Hispanic Black or African American (38%), American Indian (36%), or Hispanic or Latino (32%), while rates were lowest for children who are non-Hispanic White (13%) or Asian and Pacific Islander (13%) (Kids Count 2015).

The History of the Official Poverty Measure

CDC analyzed 2011-2014 data from the National Health and Nutrition Examination Survey (NHANES) to obtain estimates of childhood obesity prevalence by household income ($\leq 130\%$, $>130\%$ to $\leq 350\%$, and $>350\%$ of the federal poverty level [FPL]) and head of household education level (high school graduate or less, some college, and college graduate).
