Dalley's translations are made from Akkadian originals incorporating evidence from scholarship up to 1988 for the 10 myths she selects; these vary in length from very short — the two-page "Theogony of Dunnu" — to fairly long — the famous "Gilgamesh," in the Standard Version and the Old Babylonian Version, about 100 pages altogether.

Mythology Dalley published her own translations of the main Babylonian myths: Atrahasis , Anzu , The Descent of Ishtar , Gilgamesh , The Epic of Creation , Erra and Ishum . Collected into one volume, this work has made the Babylonian corpus accessible for the first time to the student of general mythology and it is widely used in university teaching.

Stephanie Dalley, in Myths from Mesopotamia, writes that "the Epic of Anzu is principally known in two versions: an Old Babylonian version of the early second millennium [BC], giving the hero as Ningirsu; and 'The Standard Babylonian' version, dating to the first millennium BC, which appears to be the most quoted version, with the hero as Ninurta". However, the Anzu character does not appear as often in some other writings, as noted below.
