The most common problem-solving courts are drug courts, but several other types of programs apply similar approaches to address violent and repeat offending, and returns to incarceration. [Note: Repeat offending is often referred to as "recidivism" in criminal justice research.]

Interventions to help offenders develop prosocial social networks, and those that increase offenders' sense of agency, self-efficacy and good problem-solving skills may be effective in reducing reoffending.

What Works to Reduce Reoffending: A Summary of the ...

- Teach problem-solving skills. Children with social anxiety disorders tend to become masters of avoidance. They do what they can to avoid engaging in situations that cause the most anxiety. While this might seem like the path of least resistance, it can actually make the social anxiety worse over time.

The problem solving process begins with identifying and naming a specific problem (e.g., symptom of psychological disorder, psychosocial stressor) (D'Zurilla & Goldfried, 1971). The therapist and client determine the parameters of the problem, such as frequency, duration, triggers, and resolution, and develop an assessment strategy (Dobson ...

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
