The Wide Range Achievement Test, Fourth Edition. The Wide-Range Achievement Test (WRAT) is a literacy screening and assessment tool developed in the 1930s by Joseph Jastak and became operational in 1946 (Robertson, 2010). The test was originally intended “to provide information on aspects of word recognition, spelling and arithmetic which would complement measures of cognitive ability being developed by David Wechsler at that time” (Makray & Hope, 2009, p. 49).

Reading achievement was assessed using the Wide-Range Achievement Test (WRAT). WRAT-3 (Wilkinson, 1993) was used for SIBS and ES intake, whereas WRAT-R (Jestak & Wilkinson, 1984) was used for the original MTFs, using the age-appropriate form (i.e., Level 1 for twins aged eleven or younger, and Level 2 for any participant older than eleven).
